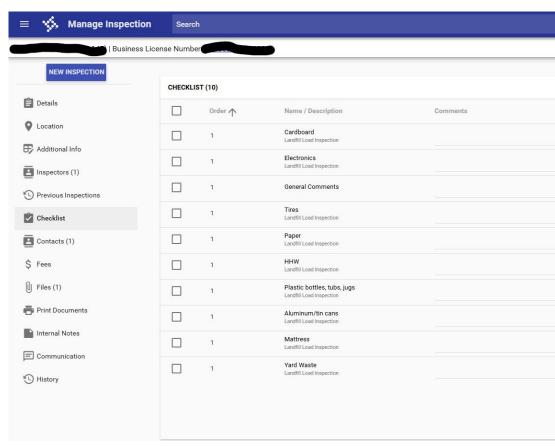

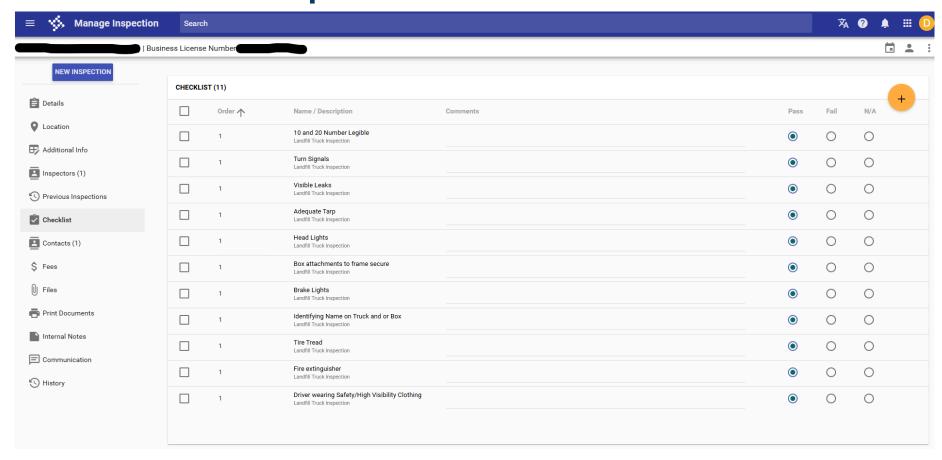

WHY WE DO What we do

We can all agree that food should not end up in the landfill. It is meant to nourish people in body, mind, and spirit. It brings us together.

It is shocking that over 35% of usable food ends up in American landfills, which is nearly 2% of our country's GDP (\$530+ billion dollars). Food waste accounts for the largest percentage of solid waste (14%) in the Sioux Falls area landfill. The consumable portion of this food waste is easily over 10,000,000 pounds per year. We must do better.

Bread Break "moves food" by transporting it from providing to receiving partners. This is win-win-win as we reduce the amount of food ending up in landfills, provide food to agencies that distribute food to people in need, and benefit businesses with robust tax incentives.

WHERE We came from

In 2011, through the visionary leadership of Mike and Jean Bauman, Bread Break picked up their first food donation. For ten years, Bread Break remained a volunteer-led program. They raised awareness, raised funds, and created a legacy of food recovery in Sioux Falls.

In 2021, this group of devoted volunteers applied for and received 501(c)3 federal nonprofit status. They formed the first Bread Break board, and hired a part time program coordinator. This step forward laid the foundation for food recovery expansion.

WHERE We are now

Bread Break's dedicated volunteer drivers use our fleet of four vans or their own vehicles to pick up daily overages of prepared and fresh food donated by our 40+ providing partners. They deliver this perfectly good food to our 30+ receiving partners such as local food banks serving people in need. We work in cooperation with other organizations such as Feeding South Dakota and Midwest Food Bank.

As the need for food recovery continues to grow, Bread Break's leadership developed a Strategic Plan in 2024 to set



the stage for sustainable growth. In addition to a part-time program coordination, they added the role of a full-time executive director. This has provided more structure through operational streamlining, community advocacy, and partnership building.

Bread Break is committed to doubling our efforts by recovering 600,000 pounds of usable food by the end of 2026. We have an ultimate goal of rescuing over one million pounds every year.

The Board of Directors guides our strategic process with the help of volunteers and staff. Every day we connect with more potential partners through outreach and networking. We are expanding our fresh produce and event meal recovery efforts.

At Bread Break, we are leading the food waste reduction and food recovery strategies in the Sioux Falls area. In the years to come, we plan to take our model to other parts of South Dakota.



To grow our capacity in the Sioux Falls area, we will need more equipment and more people power. Bread Break has invested in database and food recovery software to expand our impact in the community, but this cost is ongoing.
